

What is ESL? English as a Second Language

Texas public schools are responsible for providing one of the 6 types of bilingual education program models to support EB (emergent bilingual) students' English language acquisition.

School districts with 20 or more EB students in the same grade level must provide one of the four types of bilingual program models: Dual Language Immersion One-Way, Dual Language Immersion Two-Way, Transition Bilingual Late-Exit, and Transitional Bilingual Early-Exit.

However districts that do not meet the "rule of 20" (regardless of the number of students or grade level) must provide one of the two English as a second language (ESL) program models: Content-Based or Pull-Out.



ESL Program Model

> ESL Content Based

 In an ESL Content-Based program, students are provided English language instruction by an ESL certified teacher(s) in all content areas that are integrated with the academic content such as math or science.

> ESL Pull Out

o In a Pull-Out ESL program, an ESL certified teacher pushes in to the English language arts and reading classroom (ELAR) or pulls students out to teach ELAR. Both program models use English as the instructional language with a goal of English language proficiency.

ESL Program Model

The goal of an ESL program is for emergent bilingual students to attain full proficiency in English in order to have access to fully participate in school. The information below highlights the process of identifying emergent bilingual (EB) students.

➤ Step 1- Identification

- Home Language Survey (HLS)
 - Administered to all students upon enrollment. Student assessed if survey shows a language other than English as primary language.
 - Assessed in Listening and Speaking in grades PreK-1st
 - Assessed in Listening, Speaking, Reading, and Writing in grades 2-12.

> Step 2- Placement

- Language Proficiency Assessment Committee (LPAC): The LPAC is comprised of a Campus Administrator, an ESL teacher, and a Parent Representative who meet to determine eligibility and identify a student as emergent bilingual. The LPAC then send written notification to the parents who may accept or deny services.
 - State- Approved ESL Programs
 - ESL Content-Based
 - ESL Pull-Out

Step 3- Annual Review/Reclassification

- Data Review: From multiple sources including:
 - Classroom observations and documentation by the teacher
 - Texas English Language Proficiency Assessment System (TELPAS)
 - State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR) or other academic achievement assessments
 - Student Reclassification: A decision made by the LPAC that indicates that the student can be as successful as native-English speaking peers. The decision is based on the Reclassification chart.
 - Results: The student may reclassify as English Proficient (EP) or may continue as an Emergent Bilingual (EB) student.

➤ Step 4- Monitoring After Reclassification

- Written notification is sent to parents for approval to exit the ESL program.
- Student is placed in general education classroom upon parent approval.
- Student is monitored for two years by LPAC with annual written notice of progress sent to parents.

Instruction

What instruction will my child receive in an ESL program?

Your child will develop reading, writing, listening and speaking skills in English through the English Language Proficiency Standards (ELPS) in conjunction with their grade level academic instruction in the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) of all content areas including English Language Arts, Reading, Math, Science, and Social Studies. Content-based Language Instruction will be used to help weave together the TEKS and the ELPS by providing an approach to language instruction in which language is developed within the context of content delivery that is linguistically sustaining.




- Student will log-in to their account through Clever

How does it work?

- These accounts are set up as "students" in Summit K12. After logging in, users are automatically directed to their personal dashboard, My Summit Base, where the ELD BOY Assessment is automatically assigned.
- Completing the ELD BOY will create a Personalized Learning Plan (PLP) based on the users' test results. As an activity is completed, the next will unlock.
- After completing all ELD BOY
 Assessments and PLP #1s, the ELD MOY
 Assessment will auto-assign. And the same logic will apply to PLP #2s and then the final ELD EOY Assessments and PLPs #3.
